



FY 2005 Multnomah County A&D Treatment Services (#005-06)

The source data for the following charts and tables are from the state Client Process Monitoring System (CPMS) for Multnomah County. It includes all A&D clients served by public funded community treatment providers.

Countywide New Treatment Enrollment. The total new enrollment was 14,315 in FY2005. The following chart shows the distribution of monthly enrollment. The average new enrollment per month was 1193, with the highest in August (n=1516) and the lowest in October (n=1097). Compared to the FY2004 data (N=14955), the new treatment enrollment in FY2005 decreased by 4.3%.




Enrollee Attributes. As shown in the following bar chart, youth (<18) accounted for 8% of total treatment enrollment. Female and male adults accounted for 31% and 61%, respectively. About 70% of enrollments were White, 12.5% were African American, and 7.7% were Hispanic. Native Americans were overrepresented (6.1%) in the treatment as compared to their proportion of all county residents. In terms of insurance status, 53.5% of enrollees didn't have any insurance coverage when admitted to the treatment programs.




Referral Sources. The primary referral source for the A&D treatment was from the Criminal Justice System (43.8%). Self referrals accounted for 26% of all referral sources.


Tx Enrollment by Primary Referral Source (N=14,315)




Primary Drug Use & Treatment Modality. Excluding 'none' and 'other' categories, 44.3% of treatment episodes reported alcohol as primary drug of choice, 21.4% reported opiates, and 16.7% reported amphetamines. The percentage of using amphetamines as the primary drug (16.7%) was the highest in past six years. Fifty-eight percent reported multiple drug use.



In FY2005, the type of treatment that clients were most likely to enroll in was outpatient (40.3%), followed by DUII outpatient (23.5%) and A&D Detox (14.9%). About 12% clients were enrolled in residential treatment.




Termination Status. A total of 11,551 episodes exited from treatments in FY2005. On average, 49.9% successfully completed the treatment, 31.9% exited the treatment unsuccessfully, and 18.2% had neutral termination*. Since February 2005, the successful completion rates had exceeded 50% (See Table below).



Termination Status by Primary Drug Use. Clients using Alcohol as a primary drug had the highest successful treatment completion rate (66.5%). The completion rates for cocaine and amphetamines were 39.3% and 36.4% respectively.




Termination Status by Modality. DUII outpatient had the highest treatment completion rate (76.8%), followed by Detox (73.6%) and Residential (48.3%).



Termination Status by Length of Stay (LOS). Overall, clients staying in treatment 3 or more months were more likely to successfully complete treatment (average of 68.4% completion rate). The LOS effect was evident even after controlling for treatment modality.

Active Cases & Unique Clients Served. The total number of new and ongoing treatment cases in FY2005 was 18,692. Of those, 76.6% were new FY2005 admissions and 23.4% had started the treatment prior to FY2005. The 18,692 cases represented 14,993 unique clients. About 20% of these clients had multiple treatment episodes during the year.

* 'Fail to engagement' and 'further treatment is not appropriate' were also included in the 'Neutral termination' category, along with others (See CPMS Manual for detail). The number of cases closed in June 2005 was extremely low.
