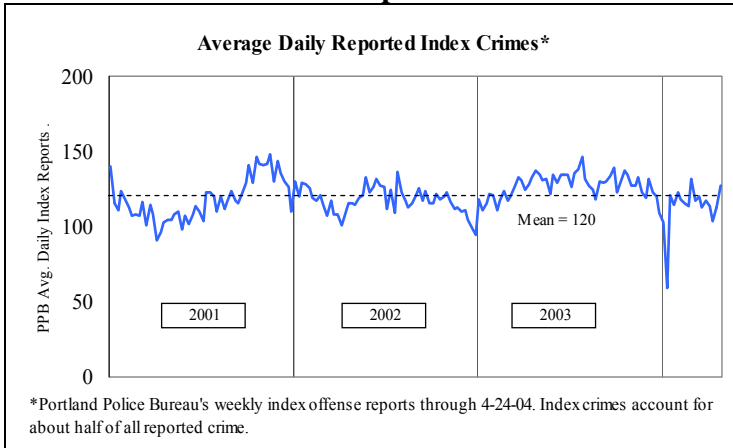
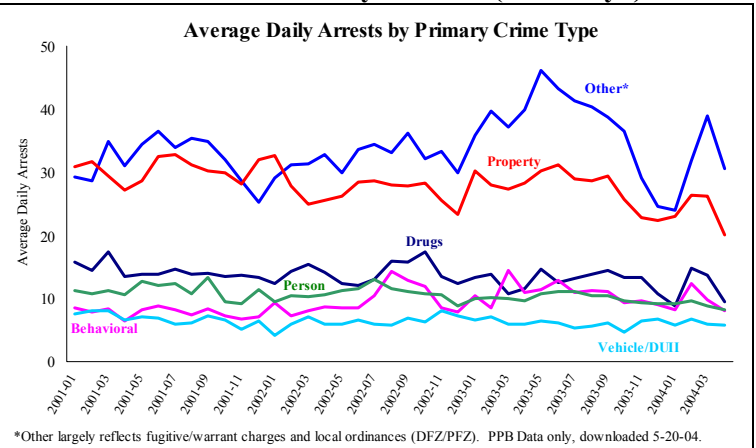

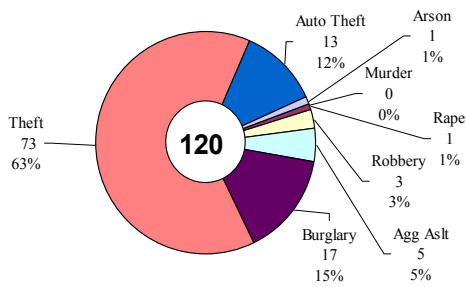
## Portland Police: Reported Offenses



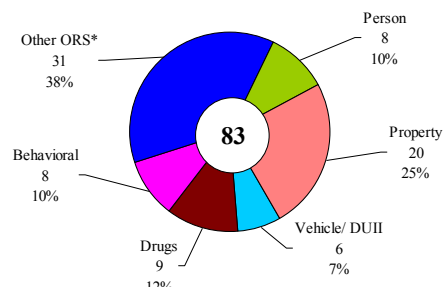
## Multnomah County: Arrests (PPB only\*)



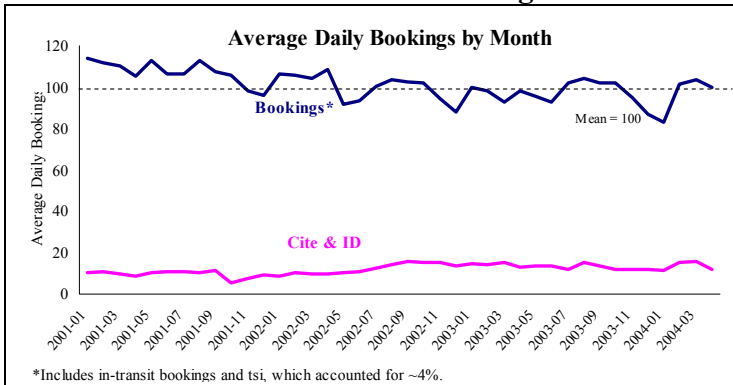
## Average Daily Reported Index Offenses\*



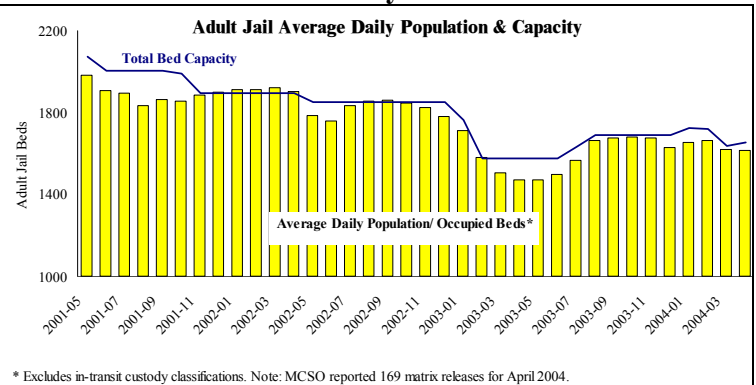
## Average Daily Arrests: April 2004



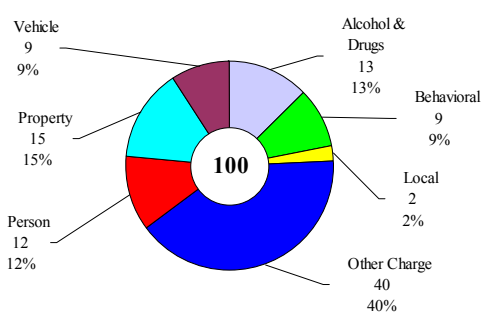
## Sheriff: Bookings



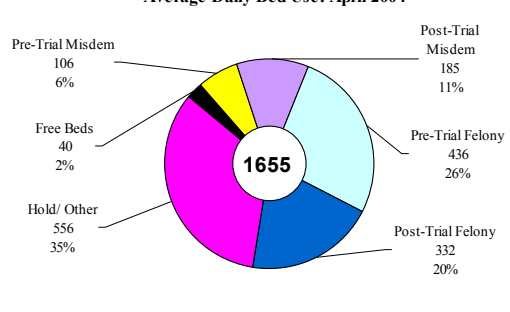
## Sheriff: Custody- Adult Jail Beds



## Average Daily Bookings\*: April 2004



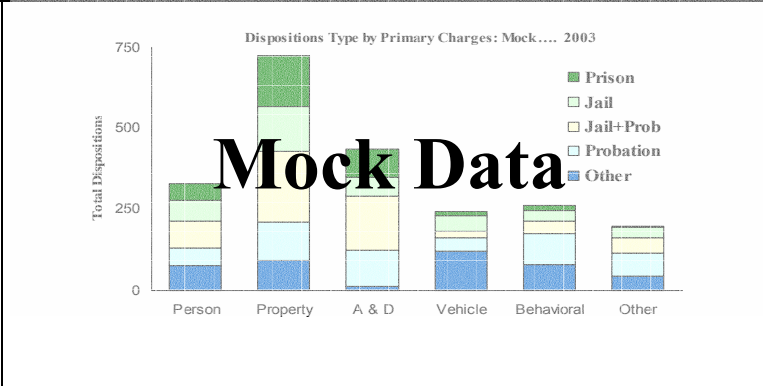
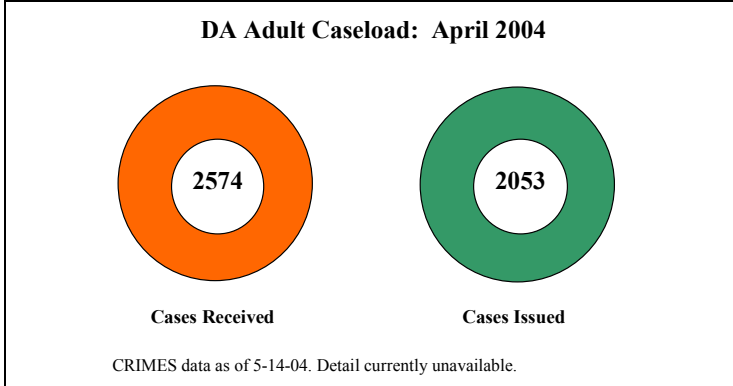
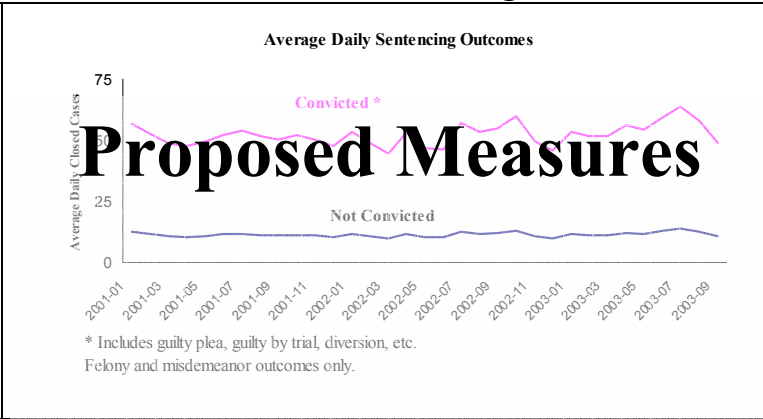
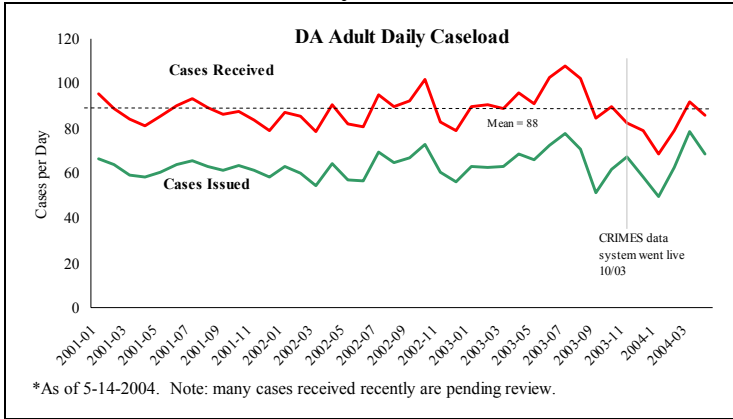
## Average Daily Bed Use: April 2004



**Notes.** PPB eliminated their arrest data backlog, however MCSO and Fairview are now backlogged and not reported herein. There was a substantial decline in daily arrest activity; 20 fewer arrests per day than the multi-year average of 102 per day. Vehicle/DUII arrests are now reported as a separate category from Other ORS; average daily arrests prove highly consistent. The *average daily jail* capacity increased to 1655 (current system capacity 1693). Matrix releases declined substantially. The MWRC work release center was 75% utilized, a slight decline from March. MWRC beds accounted for 37% of all free beds.

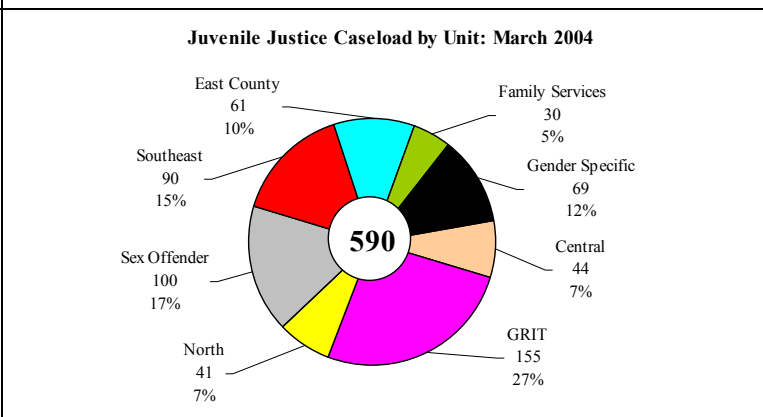
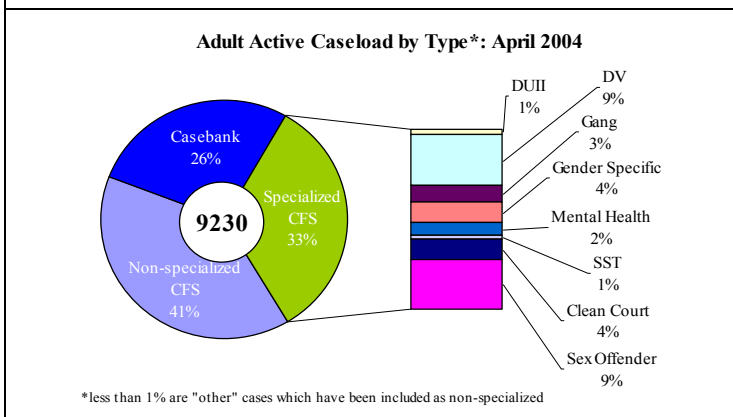
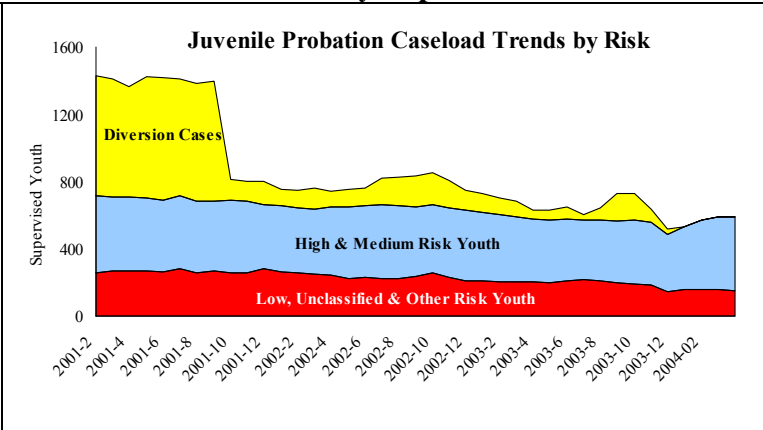
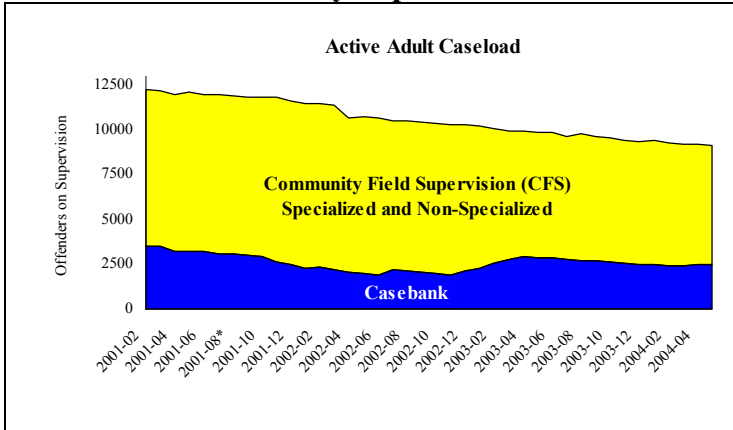

**Notes.** The DA caseload was consistent with the multi-year average, rebounding from the previous decline. The proportion of issued to received cases was 80%, 8% above average. The adult supervision caseloads decreased slightly from 9306 to 9230, driven by reductions in non-casebank offenders. The juvenile caseloads remains constant in volume, however the severity of caseload is shifting. High and medium risk youth cases have increased, while low-unclassified-other risk cases declined and diversion caseloads were eliminated.
