This conference featured numerous workshops and speakers on juvenile issues from around the country. Multnomah County has been involved in detention reform for the past 18 years and has now been invited by the Annie E. Casey Foundation to attend an upcoming conference focused on looking at the deep end of the juvenile system (for us it would be the Oregon Youth Authority).
